Voices Regret to Embassy.

Special to THE NEW YORK TIMES. WASHINGTON. March 9.—Protests by the American Embassy indignities against suffered American citizens in connection with disorders by members of the National Socialist party in Germany have produced expressions of regret from the Hitler government, assurances against a repetition of the incidents and promises of an investigation, according to a report received by the State Department today from Ambassador Sackett. Other foreign embassies in Berlin were said to have made protests in behalf of their nationals who also

suffered indignities. The matter was brought by the German Foreign Office to the attention of Cabinet members, includ-

ing Chancellor Hitler, who were said to desire to do everything pos-

sible to clear up the situation.

Few details of the attacks were received here, but the Americans involved were reported to be Henry H. Sattler, Edwin F. Dakin, Nathaniel S. Wolff and Max Schussler. Some were said to have been kidnapped and held for a few hours.
